Behind the Curtain

I sometimes get questions about writing craft, which are fun to answer. I try to address topics I think might be of interest to readers as well as writers. I'm going to tackle the topic of foreshadowing here, something I'm sure we're all familiar with



to some extent. Foreshadowing is a literary device (commonly used in many art forms) that suggests or plants the idea that something is going to happen further along in the story. Foreshadowing is generally used to create or enhance narrative tension. You'll often find it at the end of a scene or chapter, as it helps draw the readers into the next scene. Sometimes foreshadowing is guite obvious and immediately creates tension-e.g. how was I to know this would be the last time I would see my beloved alive! It can also be very subtle, planting a seed that in retrospect helps us make sense of a future event as or after it happens. One of my favorite ways to use the device is by having someone do something that doesn't seem to fit or make sense, perhaps causing the reader to wonder *why* that just happened. After all, it could have disastrous consequencesbetter read on to see how it plays out! As a reader, it can be fun to know more than the character does and/or to know that something is off kilter-we don't know exactly what it means, but we know something is afoot. A classic example is where a character is about to open a door behind which the reader knows trouble awaits. "Don't open the door!" we want to shout. Of course, we readers also like to be surprised, don't we? So, it can be fun as a writer to set up that scene and then add a twist that readers don't see coming: the characters already know one another, they're secretly in cahoots, it's the person entering who poses the real danger ... the possibilities are endless. As much as I love foreshadowing, the fact that I write the Tony Valenti thrillers in first person, present tense point of view really restricts my options. After all, with Tony as the narrator and the story unfolding in the moment, he can only be aware of what has been revealed to him at any given point in time, so he absolutely *cannot* deliver the line I used above to kick off my answer-how was I to know this would be the last time I would see my beloved alive! Masochist that I am, I kind of enjoy the additional challenge. Have a peek at some of my chapter endings to see if you can spot examples of foreshadowing.

Q: "I would like to ask if you have done anything unusual in the name of research?" Great question, and thanks to reader Debby for submitting it.

A: Like many writers, I now do the majority of my research online. I've gone down some rabbit holes with topics and people I abhor, reading biographies, interview or testimony transcripts and the like -many by some pretty appalling human beings. It's been frightening at times, but also instructive. I've gained a deep appreciation for the people who confront the world's ugliness and pain in ways many of us can't imagine. I also interview people to get a feel for how events impact them; police, reporters, paramedics, even a doctor or two. I want to get inside their skin in an effort to understand what they feel and experience in the moment, allowing me to relate that emotion to readers. Is success a jubilant Eureka! moment, or something quietly satisfying? What if they hit a dead end or a lead doesn't work out, or perhaps they lose a patient? What do they feel in those moments? Frustration, anger, perhaps a sense of forward momentum if they learn something useful in the process? Then there's the usual crime author search for unique ways to kill people and get away with it, how to destroy evidence, misdirect investigators, frame others ... all of which leads to a tired old writer joke: I never want the police to see my internet search history! At the risk of disappointing Debby, I'm afraid I haven't (yet) killed anyone to test a thesis ... well, at least that's my story and I'm sticking to it. ③
